Finances

Duct's February 2020 audited financials showed a surplus of nearly R376 000 – much better than the previous 3 years where we had a small loss each year. This is gratifying. 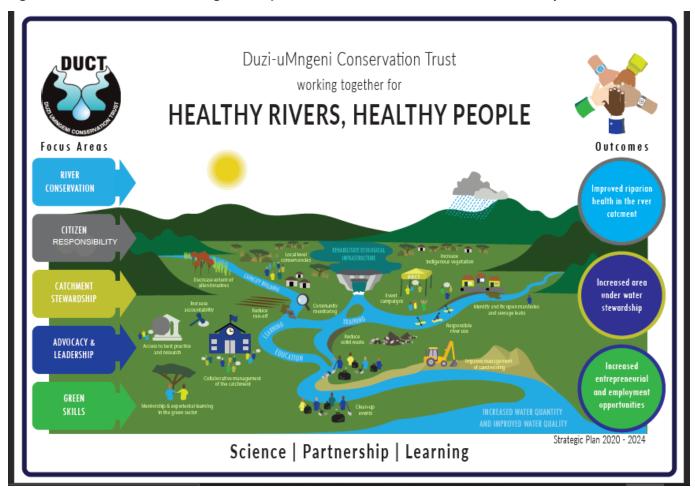

DUCT is really about implementation. We focus on a range of ecological infrastructure interventions that include:

- Alien plant eradication throughout the whole catchment
- Community based water management
- Education
- Advocacy
- Dealing with solid waste and sewer surcharges

We have simple interventions like storm water socks, and trash booms. This is primarily achieved through the employment of over 300 EPWP workers. DUCT are the hands and feet out in the communities, working every day to try and bring about change.

Why was I surprised, you may ask? DUCT *is* all of that. Yes, a resounding yes. But we are so much more now. If I look at the high-level of strategic work that we are now involved in, I can see us working across the different levels now. We are both boots on the ground, and contributing to policy shifts in the catchment.

It has been amazing to draw on my historical networks within the water services sector, and mesh these together with the extraordinary networks that being the leader of DUCT has placed me in. I have had my eyes opened to both the challenges and the opportunities in this catchment, and my passion for DUCT to be an agent of change has accelerated. We have truly shifted gears.

I will touch on 3 strategic projects a little later to illustrate this.

The gear shift has also happened internally. We have noted our lack of monitoring and evaluation in our projects – the absence of tracking the amazing successes, and also the times we have fallen short. We are putting systems in place – and have hired Larette to manage this.

We also shifted from 13 people in the office to over 30 people!! Wow. In a 3-bedroom old home. We have had to all adapt, make concessions, live through renovations, and transform our space into something more efficient. We are almost done.

The DUCT role in the catchment

- → Action on the ground
- → Community engagement
- → Partnering with government to help them fulfil their mandate
- → Building river health ambassadors by providing basic employment alongside education
- → Highlighting both the dire straits we are in, as well as the successes that are being realised

Projects

A brief timeline of the project delays was detailed as below:

Umgeni Water a 5-year project was slightly delayed, and only started in April as opposed to February.

The WRC project began on time in April 2018.

The DEA LUI and Capacity Building projects did not begin as planned in April, after months of delays and some very serious communications with Head Office in CT, the DEA Alien Clearing project finally began at the end of September.

The DEA Capacity Building Project, however, is unfortunately still delayed due to AG queries at a national level, bringing the entire programme to a halt.

The Msunduzi Sewer Monitoring phase 1 ended in June, and should have moved seamlessly to phase 2 in July. However, delays with Council resolution have resulted in DUCT only signing the contract in the first week of December and therefore will really only be able to start in January 2019. And the uMgungundlovu project that should have started in 2017 has been delayed repeatedly due to local politics. DUCT got the final go ahead with the 7th iteration of the proposal, which has been awaiting the MMs signature for the past month. This year there are a total of 16 projects that are underway.

DEA Alien Clearing

- → 17 x Supervisors/contractors
- → 22 x Brushcutter/ Chainsaw operators
- → 22 x First aiders & Health and Safety Reps
- → 126 x Herbicide applicators
- → On the ground for two months, 10 teams of 11
- → The aim for year 1 is to clear nearly 4000ha

Umgeni Water Darvill

This five-year project started in April 2018, employing 10 youths and aims to equip them with as much knowledge and skills to help them establish their own SMME.

WRC - Knowledge Sharing

This five-year project aims on improving water security by integrating biodiversity and ecosystem services into planning, finance and development in the water sector.

Achievements

Task 1

Gathered documents relating to finance and investment in ecological infrastructure

Task 2

 MAP & TRACK: Developing a stakeholder database and tracking tool that outlines the project related role-players, their relationship to the project.

Scope

To develop and capacity incentives for mainstreaming ecological infrastructure value into national, regional and local development policy and finance, with application demonstrated in two water catchments.

Msunduzi Sewer Monitoring

To reduce sewerage leakages and surcharges into the Msunduzi river system within national environmental legal compliance requirements, as well as to contribute towards community and river health and an enabling environment for local economic development, open space management and healthy outdoor activity within the Msunduzi Municipality.

Achievements

Provided a public awareness and educational programme to change behaviours amongst the public that contributes towards sewerage blockages and to secure community support for the monitoring and reporting of leaking, blocked and surcharging sewer system.

Scope

Reduce sewage/water leakage and surcharge, as well as solid waste and other forms of pollution that are entering the Msunduzi River system.

Kevin McCann's Topic: Can we change our value system to integrate the environment into our current global economic model

The elephant in the room is the Corona Virus. Although this has been a major health and economic crisis, with lockdowns happening all around we have experienced a visible decrease in all kinds of pollution. We have seen animals returning to their natural habitats, seen the peaks of the Himalayas that have previously been covered with smoke/ unnatural clouds and gases. So, although we might be suffering currently, there is some good that came from this pandemic.

Kevin went on to explain that the current value hierarchy we are forced to follow makes it seem like the basis of all human progress is the economy instead of it being nature. We should be preserving our non-renewable sources instead of over-exploiting them. We value the economy more than nature right now because the resources are still available. What happens when all the resources run out. What is our country left with after that, as wealth also runs out after some time? Creating energy is costing our country much more than its monetary value. We should be creating more energy using renewable resources.

There are various threats to our environment which sees us losing various plants and animals to extinction. There could have been measures taken to prevent this if our country wasn't too focused on the economy instead of the environment. The question still remains; Why is the government not investing heavily in environmental protection. The lack of awareness remains a major downfall in nature conservation. Locally, a high percentage of people living around wetlands, rivers, streams and dams are not taking care of their resources as they should be. Instead with the increase of population comes the deterioration of our water sources. Solid and Human waste are affecting many of our water sources and that includes industrial

waste. We have to find a way to teach people that they must preserve the water we currently have and treat it better so that its available for them and other people in future.
